Advent, Year B:*

Isaiah 64:1-9

Psalms 80:1-7, 17-19

1 Corinthians 1:3-9

Mark 13:24-37

Today is the first Sunday of the liturgical year. The theme for this first week of Advent is the hopeful watching and waiting for the coming of Christ, the Lord. As did the ancient church, in this Advent season we joyfully remember the first coming of Jesus to His earth, and at the same time look forward with joyful expectation to His coming again in glory. As we worship, we ponder with great thanksgiving our life now, “in the meantime,” and celebrate that He has called us into His story.

PROFESSION OF FAITH

Let us together profess the faith of the church of all ages in the words of this hymn of the ancient church:

You are God; we praise You.
You are the Lord; we acclaim You.
You are the Eternal Father; All creation worships You.
To You all angels, all the powers of heaven, sing in endless praise:

**Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might,
Heaven and earth are full of Your glory.**

The glorious company of apostles praises you.
The noble fellowship of prophets praises you.

The white-robed army of martyrs praises you.

Throughout the world the holy Church acclaim You;
Father of majesty unbounded,

Your true and only Son, worthy of all worship,
and the Holy Spirit, advocate and guide.

You, Christ, are the King of glory,
the eternal Son of the Father.

*When You became man to set us free
You did not shun the Virgin's womb.*

You overcame the sting of death,
and opened the kingdom of heaven to all believers.

You are seated at God's right hand in glory.

We believe that you will come and be our judge.

Come then, Lord, and help Your people,
bought with the price of Your own blood,
and bring us with Your saints to glory everlasting.

Ellen's setting of O Come, O Come, Emmanuel is available in the music catalog as a lead sheet. The harmonic arrangement varies from verse to verse. This is especially moving when all four verses are sung at one point in a service. But it also adds interest to the movement of the weeks of Advent season to sing successive verses each week as the Sundays build toward the celebration of Christ's birth on December 25. We sing the first verse here to close our prayers of Invocation on this Hope Sunday.

I have crafted this antiphonal Profession of Faith from the ancient hymn Te Deum laudamus, attributed to the fourth-century church fathers Ambrose and Augustine. From its acclamation of praise from all creation to the triune God of the universe, to its declaration of the victory and exaltation of Christ, this ancient text leads powerfully and lovingly into a time of confession, repentance and forgiveness. During Advent, the classic hymn Come, Thou Long-Expected Jesus is a fitting and beautiful sung response to the concluding words of Te Deum laudamus, “Come then, Lord, and help Your people....”

Come, Thou Long-Expected Jesus

Come, Thou long-expected Jesus,
Born to set Thy people free.
From our fears and sins release us;
Let us find our rest in Thee.
Israel's Strength and Consolation,
Hope of all the earth Thou art;
Dear Desire of every nation,
Joy of every longing heart.

Born Thy people to deliver,
Born a Child and yet a King,
Born to reign in us forever,
Now Thy gracious kingdom bring.
By Thine own eternal Spirit,
Rule in all our hearts alone;

Raise us to Thy glorious throne.

We use the text of today's psalm as refrain of our corporate prayer of penitence. It is echoed in the closing lyrics of Send Out Your Light.

LIGHTING OF THE FIRST ADVENT CANDLE: HOPE

Reading: from Isaiah 56:1 and 64:1-9

Lighting of the candle

Leader: Prepare the way of the Lord.

*We light this candle as a symbol of expectation
and hope of the coming of our Savior, Jesus.*

**May the light sent from God shine in the darkness
to show us the way to salvation.
O come, O come, Emmanuel!**

Leader: Prepare, then, the way of the Lord.

This hymn is not often thought of as an Advent hymn, but it should be. It powerfully highlights our understanding of Advent as one of those points in God's story where He "folds time," bringing together the transcendent reality and redemptive work of the past and future. We sing the first three verses here, and close the service with the fourth verse.
