LECTIONARY for the second Sunday of Advent, Year B:

Isaiah 40:1-11 Psalm 85:1-2, 8-13 2 Peter 3:8-15a Mark 1:1-8

The theme for this second week of Advent is Love. "Advent" comes from the Latin word for "coming," and so during this season we often refer to Christ as The Coming One. On this Sunday we consider the immense and amazing love of God shown in the coming of Christ—in His first coming in human flesh as the Word incarnate; in His promised second coming in power and glory at the end of the age; and in His coming to our hearts daily in a continually renewal of our relationship with Him.

This second Advent Sunday is also the time the Church traditionally focuses on John the Baptist. What does the message of John the Baptist have to do with this dual-time-focused love of God, and with His continual presence in our lives? And how might this hopeful expectation of His love assist us in preparing our hearts for His coming now, as we wait, "in the meantime"?

The gathering antiphonal reading, for two readers and the congregation, weaves together psalm texts that remind us of God's covenant love, the blessing of the hope of His promises, and the comfort and beauty of His presence.

This joyful hymn of Advent expectation and confident hope in the fulfillment of all God's promises through the prophets down through the ages begins the service with a ringing declaration: "We will make Him welcome!"

INVOCATION

Prayers of adoration, praise, and thanksgiving for God's presence

O Wisdom proceeding from the mouth of the Most High, reaching from eternity to eternity and ordering all things with strength and sweetness:

Profession of Faith

We believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible.

He will come again with glory to judge the living and the dead. His kingdom will never end.

And we believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life.

He proceeds from the Father,

and with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified. He spoke through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic church. We affirm one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look forward to the resurrection of the dead, and to life in the world to come.

Amen.

The closing words of our corporate prayers of invocation are drawn from the ancient O Antiphons (as are each of the verses of the Advent hymn, O Come, O Come, Emmanuel).

Ellen's setting of O Come, O Come, Emmanuel is available in the music catalog as a lead sheet. The harmonic arrangement varies from verse to verse. As we mentioned last week, this is especially moving when all four verses are sung at one point in a service. But it also adds interest to the movement of the weeks of Advent season as the Sundays build toward the celebration of Christ's birth on December 25. You'll notice that each of the verses of the hymn corresponds to and reflects the journey we follow as we go through the four weeks of Advent. We sing the second verse here to close our prayers of Invocation on this Love Sunday.

The Nicene Creed is particularly appropriate for this second Sunday of Advent, as we contemplate the words of the prophet Isaiah who foretold the message of John the Baptist, who is often identified as the last of the Old Covenant prophets. We also see reflected in the first stanza of the Creed the ancient hymn text, "Of the Father's Love Begotten," which follows as our sung response to the profession of our faith.

Psalm 126 Luke 1:46b-55

1 Thessalonians 5:16-24 John 1:6-8, 19-28

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This fourth verse of the song at Table closes the worship service with a strong statement of praise and a prayer of dedication.

These Sending words of charge and benediction are drawn from Paul's words of the blessing and power of God's love found in 1 Thessalonians 3. (Note their resonance with the prayer of confession, above.)
