LECTIONARY for the second Sunday of Easter, Year B

Acts 4:32-35 Psalm 133 1 John 1:1—2:2 John 20:19-31

We come now to the second Sunday in the liturgical season of Eastertide. For many churches, and individuals, the tendency is to think of Easter as a one-day event—the highest day of the Christian year, surely, but also as the day we celebrate the Resurrection of Christ from the dead. But in the tradition of the Christian year, Easter is a fifty-day period of celebration beginning with Resurrection Sunday and culminating on the Day of Pentecost. During Eastertide, the Church considers and contemplates the meaning and significance of the Resurrection not only for each one of us individually who are now redeemed and seek to walk moment by moment as His disciples, but also its significance for all of creation. During this season in each of the yearly cycles, the lectionary invites us to focus on several aspects of our relationship with Christ in view of the victory He won in His dying and rising again to life in His resurrection glory.

The second Sunday of Easter is sometimes called Saint Thomas Sunday because the Gospel reading tells the narrative of Jesus' appearance to the assembled disciples, which on this day included Thomas, but who was not present at His first appearance on the evening of Resurrection Day. If we read between the lines, and listen carefully, we can almost hear Jesus' words, "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe" (Jn. 20:29), echoing in the opening words of John's first epistle: "We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life...'

Profession of Faith

We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the Word of Life.

This Life was revealed, and we have seen it and testify to it, and declare to you the eternal life that was with the Father and was revealed to us.

- 1 John 1:1-2

A thought about worship from the ancient Fathers -

"Our confession must not contain lazy or deliberately vague words. There must not be any space between our heart and lips, lest what should be the confession of true reverence become a mask for evil. The Word must be near us and within us. There must not be any delay between the heart and the lips. We must have a faith of conviction as well as of words. . . . The Apostle Paul explains the prophet's words: 'That is the word of faith, which we preach; because if thou shalt confess with thy mouth Jesus as Lord, and shalt believe in thy heart that God hath raised Him up from the dead, thou shalt be saved.' . . . Faith lies in simplicity, righteousness in faith, and true godliness in confession. For God doesn't call us to the blessed life through tiring investigations. He doesn't tempt us with rhetoric. The way to eternity is plain and easy: believe that God raised Jesus from the dead and confess that He is the Lord. . . . Jesus Christ died so that we could live in Him."
