GATHERING

Acts 3:12-19 Psalm 4 1 John 3:1-7 Luke 24:36b-48

In the liturgical year, the season traditionally known as Eastertide is a distinct period of fifty days, beginning with Resurrection Sunday and culminating on the Day of Pentecost. During Eastertide, the Church focuses on the ongoing meaning and significance of Christ's sacrifice and resurrection for the redemption of all of God's creation.

The third Sunday of Easter is traditionally devoted to the theme of wor*ship—in particular, worship of the* risen Christ. Today we see this theme threaded throughout the lectionary, *especially in the triumph of life over* death, and hope over despair. These *expressions—of praise for the healing* of a man born lame, of the gladness in our hearts when we God's goodness displayed, of the peace that comes with the presence of Christ—have an especially powerful conclusion in the promise found in 1 John 3: When Christ is revealed we will be like *Him. because we will see Him as He* is.

How ought this glorious promise affect the way we see, and the way we live, now?

A thought about worship from the Ancient Fathers -

"I boldly affirm that He who is above every name has many names in relation to us. And I receive them according to His various ways of dealing graciously with us. He is called the Light when He disperses the gloom of ignorance. He is the Life when He gives us the blessing of eternal life. He is called the Way when He guides us from error to the truth. Also He is called a 'Tower of strength,' a 'City of encompassing,' a Fountain, a Rock, a Vine, a Physician, and the Resurrection. All such terms refer to the various righteous blessings He gave to us. But those who set their sights on things beyond human understanding, who see the incomprehensible, but overlook what is comprehensible, use such titles to explain God. They are not only positive that they see Him, but measure Him whom no one has seen or can see. . . . And it seems fitting to warn young archers not to shoot at an impossible target while faith is available to them. We must warn them to drop their useless efforts to understand the incomprehensible, and not to lose the blessings at hand, which are found by faith alone."

Lectionary for next week: Acts 4:5-12 Psalm 23 1 John 3:16-24 John 10:11-18

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Today's benediction is a variation of the collect for the second Sunday after the Epiphany from the Book of Common Prayer.
