LECTIONARY for the second Sunday after the Epiphany, Year C:

Isaiah 62:1-5 Psalm 36:5-10 I Corinthians 12:1-11 John 2:1-11

During the season of Epiphany, the third season of the liturgical year, the Church focuses on the revelation of Christ to the world. Having spent the four weeks of Advent in eager anticipation of Christ's coming, and the twelve days of Christmastide celebrating the wonder and importance of His birth, we now turn our attention to the Person and Work of Jesus in His incarnation here on earth. And we look, with renewed thanksgiving and amazement, at His deeds and the revelation of God's heart for the world He created.

While the word epiphany literally means "manifestation," or "appearing," in our everyday lives we most often think of an epiphany as an "aha moment"—an insight into something beyond the ordinary, and always with momentous meaning and significance for our lives. On this second Sunday after the day of Epiphany, we focus on Jesus' first public miracle. When Jesus turned water into wine, John's gospel tells us, He "manifested His glory; and His disciples believed in Him."

Each of the texts in today's lectionary invite us to consider some aspect of the relationship between light, the revelation of God's character and goodness, and His glory. What can we learn from them about walking in the light of the glory of Christ, who is Himself the Light of the World?

A thought about worship from the Ancient Fathers -

"Foolish people too often dare to complain against their Creator, not only when they lack something, but also when they have plenty. When something isn't given to them, they complain. And when they have certain things in abundance, they are ungrateful. ... Let us rejoice in whatever gifts He gives. Those who have used great possessions well should also use small ones well. For plenty and scarcity may be equally good for us. Even in spiritual progress we won't be discouraged by small results if our minds aren't dry and barren. For what the earth doesn't give must spring from the soil of our heart. Those who don't stop giving will always be supplied with the means to give. We must use what each year gives us in godly works. Difficult seasons must not hinder our Christian generosity. For the Lord knows how to replenish the widow's jars, which her holy hospitality emptied. He knows how to turn water into wine. He knows how to satisfy 5,000 hungry persons with a few loaves. And the One we feed through His poor people can multiply what He takes of what He gave us."
