Jonah 3:1-5, 10 Psalm 62:5-12 1 Corinthians 7:29-31 Mark 1:14-20

On this third Sunday of the season of Epiphany, we continue our focus and reflection on the Person, work, and glorious acts of Jesus in His incarnation here on earth. In these readings, the lectionary again directs our attention to parallel stories of calling—this time, with a focus on the contrasting responses of the prophet Jonah, who ran from God's call to join Him in His purposes for the world, and Jesus' calling of Simon Peter, Andrew, James, and John, who immediately left their old lives behind to follow Him.

The Old Testament narrative of Jonah is a familiar one: The prophet initially resists God's instructions, and instead runs in the opposite direction. But he can't outrun or hide from God, who brings about a fierce storm; and when Jonah is cast overboard in order to calm it, God provides a large fish to swallow Jonah. Three days and nights in the belly of the fish bring Jonah to repentance. Thus returned to his commitment to serve God, he goes to Nineveh and delivers the message of God's judgment on the people.

But does Jonah really return to a position of trust and rest in God, recognizing Him as his only refuge and hope? And where might we see ourselves in this cautionary tale of obedience, compassion, and mercy?

The Gathering antiphonal reading weaves together Psalm passages that speak of trust and rest in our eternal and powerful God, who alone is our refuge and deliverer in times of storm and tumult.

This well-known hymn echoes the refuge and resounds the praise of the Psalm readings. Praise to the Lord, who doth prosper Thy work and defend thee; Surely His goodness and mercy Here daily attend thee. Ponder anew What the Almighty can do, If with His love He befriend thee.
