LECTIONARY for the third Sunday after the Epiphany, Year C:

Nehemiah 8:1-3, 5-6, 8-10 Psalm 19 1 Corinthians 12:12-31a Luke 4:14-21

On this third Sunday of the season of Epiphany, we continue our focus and reflection on the Person, work, and glorious acts of Jesus in His incarnation here on earth. As we walk through this season, we are alert to those "a-ha moments" when God manifests His glory and/or reveals something to us of His purposes for us and the world. We are expecting and watching for "epiphanies."

In today's readings, the lectionary invites us to ponder the power and blessing of the written and spoken word of God—to us individually, to the community of believers, and to the world He created. In Psalm 19 we read of the majesty of the Lord displayed and revealed in creation, and are reminded that His laws are perfect, His precepts are right ... His words are precious and a source of great joy. In Nehemiah, we read of the celebration and rejoicing of the returned exiles at their literal rediscovery of the written Scriptures. And in *Luke's gospel, we find the remarkable* scene where Jesus went to the Synagogue in Nazareth on the Sabbath ("as was His custom"), chose a passage from the book of Isaiah, and revealed something astonishing about Himself. He read the words of one of the messianic prophecies telling of the Messiah's ministry of preaching and healing, and then declared: "Today this scripture is fulfilled in your hearing."

When we read or hear the word of the Lord, what is our response—and what ought to be our response—to His revelation of Himself and the truths woven throughout His story? How does our response to the word of God enable us to walk more fully in the light of the glory of Christ, who is the Light of the world?
