#### **GATHERING**

Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion!

Shout aloud, O daughter of Jerusalem!

Behold, your King is coming to you;

He is just and endowed with salvation, humble, and mounted on a donkey, even on a colt, the foal of a donkey.

- Zechariah 9:9

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, He sent two of His disciples.

He said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it.

If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this: 'The Lord has need of it,' and immediately he will send it here."

They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street.

As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?"

The disciples answered just as Jesus had commanded them. And they allowed them to take it.

Then they brought the colt to Jesus and put their cloaks on it.
And He sat on it.
And many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches they had cut in the fields.

Those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting:

"Hosanna! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the coming kingdom of our father David! Hosanna in the highest!"

And Jesus went into Jerusalem, and into the temple.

The Liturgy of the Passion Isaiah 50:4-9a Psalm 31:9-16 Philippians 2:5-11 Mark 14:1-15:47

This Sunday brings us to the final Sunday of our Lenten journey. In some ways, Palm Sunday doesn't feel like Lent, because the mood, at least initially, is one of joyous celebration. But we also remember that the same crowd that hailed Jesus at the beginning of the week with cries of "Hosanna! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!" is the crowd that mocked, scorned, and rejected Him at its end.

Some congregations focus solely on the Liturgy of the Palms on this sixth Sunday of Lent, and incorporate the texts of the Liturgy of the Passion into services later in Holy Week. Others acknowledge the turn in the attitude of the people within the sermon (teaching) or elsewhere in the course of the Palm Sunday service. This liturgy follows the latter course as preparation for the final week of Lent, during which we walk with Christ through the last week of His earthly life and ministry—walking in His own footsteps, praying that we may take on His likeness as we are more and more formed in His image, as we follow Him in His journey to the foot of the cross.

The Gathering reading can be done outside the door of the church or meeting place, or in the narthex or other welcoming area, if you plan for your congregation to process into the worship space with palm branches. If not, then this antiphonal reading can be spoken as the opening of worship in the sanctuary or worship space. The opening lines, from Zechariah,

are spoken by the pastor, priest or other lead reader, with the congregation reading the bold text. The people are divided into two groups for reading the Mark narrative, with the text in bold read by everyone.

This contemporary (now classic) song of joyful worship draws us into the shouts of praise heard in Jerusalem at Christ's triumphal entry. We adapted the fourth-verse lyric, singing "Hosanna" instead of the original "Hallelujah," to echo the shouts of the crowds as Christ entered into Jerusalem. If you do plan to process with palm or other branches, it is best to choose a song or hymn that is familiar, and that has a tempo and meter that makes it easy to sing and walk with the branches. An alternate choice might be Holy, Holy, Holy Lord (CCLI Song #27006) by Peter Scholtes, ©1966 F.E.L. Publications. Another Twila Paris song that fits well for this week is He Is Exalted (CCLI Song #17827. ©1985 Straightway Music | Mountain Spring Music)

The Psalm of the Liturgy of the Palms is set here as a reading for one lead reader and the whole congregation.

## Profession of Faith

The word of the Lord:

This is one of the traditional hymns for Palm Sunday. We sing it in 6/8, rather than in 4/4, to heighten the sense of joy in our welcoming praise to the One who comes in the Name of the Lord.

You might want to sing this third verse of the Gathering hymn in its original 4/4 meter, or a bit slower than above, to reflect that the setting of Palm Sunday is not many days before Christ's passion.

The Profession of Faith weaves together texts that speak of the Person and Work of Christ, and of the eternal praise and worship of which He alone is worthy.

#### PRAYERS OF CONFESSION

Righteous God of all time, You have crowned Jesus Christ as Lord of all. We have joyfully praised Him with shouts of "Hosanna!" Yet we confess that we do not always bow before Him, nor follow Him with our whole hearts.

[Silence]

In your mercy, forgive us.

Help us to lay at Your feet all that we have and all that we are, trusting You to forgive and cleanse what is sinful, to heal what is broken, and to receive us as Your own.

[Silent confessions]

Draw us near the foot of the cross, so that, dying and rising with Him, we may walk in Your ways, to the glory of Your name. Through Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, now and forever. Amen.

Our Sending hymn text is from another of the traditional Palm Sunday anthems, set to the same tune as the Gathering hymn. This one we sing in the original 4/4 meter.

Even on Palm Sunday, it is customary to refrain from including the usual closing of the benediction, "Alleluia! Alleluia! In a sense, we fast from this exuberant expression of praise, which makes it all the more meaningful and glorious when—next week!—we declare on Resurrection Sunday, "Christ is risen, Alleluia!"
