LECTIONARY for the fifteenth Sunday after Pentecost, Year B:

Song of Solomon 2:8-13 Psalm 45:1-2, 6-9 Deuteronomy 4:1-2, 6-9 Psalm 15 James 1:17-27 Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

On this fifteenth Sunday after the Day of Pentecost, we-the Churchcontinue our study of and reflection on the many ways we are led and directed, in every aspect of our lives, by the loving guidance and power of the Holy Spirit. With this week, and continuing for the next four Sundays, we focus on what might be called matters of practical living. The epistle of James emphasizes the living out of our faith by our walk in the world. The Old Testament passages discuss the *importance and life-giving power of* wise living, how we learn and incorporate Godly wisdom into our lives, and the consequences of rejecting the gift of Godly wisdom. In the passages from Mark's gospel are recorded examples of Godly living and acting in the world in the life of Christ, who is the wisdom of God (1 Cor. 1:24, 30).

Today, our attention is turned to the ways in which we perceive and know the voice of God. And just as importantly, what do we do with the messages He communicates to us? James encourages us in his reminder that it was in fulfillment of God's own purpose for us that He gave us birth by the word of truth. James exhorts us to be quick to listen, and—having heard the word—we must be effectual doers of the word, not merely forgetful hearers. In this way, Deuteronomy says, you "will show your wisdom and discernment to the peoples..."

Lord, make our ears attuned and alert to the sound of Your voice (Song 2:8)! May our hearts overflow with the "goodly theme[s]" we have heard! And may our tongues and lives ever be as the pens of ready writers, eager to proclaim and display Your grace and wisdom.

A thought about worship from the Ancient Fathers – "When we pray let our words and requests be disciplined, maintaining quietness and modesty. Let us consider ourselves as standing in God's sight. We must please the divine eyes both with the use of our body and with the tone of our voice. For, as it is characteristic for a shameless person to be noisy with his cries, it is fitting for the modest man to pray with calm requests. Moreover, the Lord told us to pray in secret, which is best suited to faith—in hidden and remote places and in our very bedrooms. Then we can know that God is present everywhere and hears and sees everything. In His abundant majesty, He enters even into hidden and secret places. It is written, 'I am a God at hand, and not a God afar off. If a man shall hide himself in secret places, shall I not then see him? Do not I fill heaven and earth?' And again: 'The eyes of the Lord are in every place, beholding the evil and the good.' When we meet with believers in one place and celebrate God's sacrifice with Christ, His Priest, we should be modest and disciplined. We shouldn't throw about our prayers indiscriminately with untamed voices, nor cast a request to God with overbearing wordiness when it should be mentioned modestly. For God isn't the hearer of the voice, but of the heart." – Cyprian
