LECTIONARY for the sixteenth Sunday after Pentecost, Year B:

Proverbs 22:1-2, 8-9, 22-23 Psalm 125 Isaiah 35:4-7a Psalm 146 James 2:1-17 Mark 7:24-37

This sixteenth Sunday of Proper ("ordinary," counted) time in this long season of Pentecost continues the yearly, extended time of study and reflection for the Church on the ways in which God's people walk and live daily, together in community as well as in the wider world, under the guidance and direction of the Holy Spirit. This week is the second in a five-week focus on what might be thought of as matters of practical living.

The lectionary today directs our attention to the relationship between faith and works. More specifically, these texts discuss God's definition of and attitude toward riches and wealth and what definition, perspective, and attitude toward wealth should be ours. Several questions are threaded through these readings: What are true riches? What is true benevolence? What is the relationship between in*justice, favoritism, and pride? What* are God's promises to those who are generous, and the consequences to those who are "crooked in their ways" (Psalm 125) and cold? What do we learn from Christ's example? Some of the answers may be surprising, and most will confront and challenge us.

A thought about worship from the Ancient Fathers –

"It is better for a man to be silent and be a Christian than to speak and not be a follower of Christ. Those who profess themselves to be Christ's are known not only by what they say, but also by what they practice. 'For the tree is known by its fruit.' It is better to be silent and be a Christian than to speak and not be a follower of Christ. 'The kingdom of God is not in word, but in power.' People 'believe with the heart and confess with the mouth,' the one 'unto righteousness,' the other 'unto salvation.' It is good to teach if the one who speaks also acts. For the one who shall both 'do and teach, the same shall be great in the kingdom.' Our Lord and God, Jesus Christ, the Son of the Living God, first did and then taught, as Luke testifies, 'whose praise is in the Gospel through all the churches.' There is nothing which is hidden from the Lord, but our secrets are near to Him. Let us, therefore, do all things as those who have Him dwelling in us, that we may be His temples and He may be in us as God. Let Christ speak in us, even as He did in Paul. Let the Holy Spirit teach us to speak the things of Christ in like manner as He did."
