GATHERING

LECTIONARY for the fourth Sunday after Pentecost, Year B:

1 Samuel 17:1-18:16 Psalm 9:9-20; Psalm 133 Job 38:1-11 Psalm 107:1-3, 23-32 2 Corinthians 6:1-13 Mark 4:35-41

This week marks the fifth Sunday of "ordinary" time, the long season between the day of Pentecost and the four Sundays of Advent, when we-God's people—focus our study and reflection on the ways in which we walk and live, in all aspects of our lives, under the continual guidance and all-sufficient power of the Holy Spirit. In this longest period of the liturgical year. the emphasis of the epistle texts is on the Church—our journey of faith, our identity in Christ, and our living together as Christ's Body here on earth. The gospel passages, in Year B taken from Mark's writings and in a few weeks from the book of John, direct our attention to Christ's earthly ministry as He interacted with, taught, healed, and met the needs of the people, all the while training the disciples. In Year B, the main Old Testament readings trace the history of our faith and its foundations as recorded in the narratives of the ancient kingdom of Israel. The second ("alternate") Old Testament *readings are chosen to complement* the gospel texts, but—as we see each week—all of the lectionary texts "speak" to one another in interesting ways that illumine each the other and reveal new insights into the Scripture and into God's will and plan for His people. Each of the Psalm passages shows us how these narratives and highlights of our gracious God's character and mighty acts were commemorated and incorporated into His people's ancient worship of Him.

The lectionary this week continues the themes of how we see and perceive the conditions around us, and the relationship between sight (both physical and spiritual) and faith as we live and walk out our lifelong journeys as Christ's followers. Here we find the well-loved Bible story of David and Goliath. David, though "a youth,"

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was already known as "a mighty man of valor, a warrior" (2 Samuel 16:18). *Nevertheless, the Philistine champion, Goliath "the giant." was a formidable* enemy. Yet David, armed with his staff, his sling, five carefully chosen stones—and most importantly, the assurance that the LORD would save him and deliver Goliath into his *hand—victoriously prevailed over the* army ranged against Israel. Such a wonderful narrative! With so much encouragement and so many lessons for us, in so many ways! And as we read through the passages in Job and the Psalms. we see descriptions and resonances of praise for God's deliverance in similarly outwardappearing, dire circumstances; just as we read in Paul's account of his victories through Christ, and in Mark's account of Christ calming the storm. wind, and waves to the relief and astonishment of the terrified disciples. *As you read through this liturgy (the* readings, the prayers, the songs), ask the Lord what He would have you see about your walk with Him, and in what ways He wants-today-to increase your faith in Him.

PROFESSION OF FAITH As you have received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk in Him, firmly rooted and built up in Him and established in your faith, just as you were instructed, and overflowing with gratitude. In Him all the fullness of Deity dwells in bodily form, and He has made us complete in Him, who is the head of all rule and authority, principality and power. In Him we also were circumcised with a circumcision made without hands. in the removal of the body of the flesh by the circumcision of Christ. We were buried with Him in baptism, in which we were also raised up with Him through faith in the working of God, who raised Him from the dead. When we were dead in our sins and in the uncircumcision of our flesh, God made us alive together with Christ. And He forgave us all our transgressions, having cancelled out the certificate of debt against us with its legal demands, which was hostile to us. He set this aside, having nailed it to the cross. *When He disarmed the rulers and authorities. He made a public display of them,* having triumphed over them through Him. We hold fast to the Head, Christ Jesus the Lord, from whom the entire body, being supplied and held together by the joints and ligaments, grows with a growth which is from God. - from Colossians 2:6-19 PRAYERS OF CONFESSION In You, LORD, we have taken refuge; let us never be put to shame; deliver us in Your righteousness. A thought about worship from the Ancient Fathers -

"Let us dwell on the fact that while the Lord is with us, our enemies can't hurt us. When they approach us, they conform to the state they find us in. They adapt their delusions to the condition of our minds. Therefore, if they find us timid and confused, they will attack us like robbers, finding our minds unguarded. . . . But if they see us rejoicing in the Lord, contemplating future bliss, mindful of the Lord, regarding all things to be in His hand, and knowing that no evil spirit has any strength against Christians, . . . our enemies are defeated and turned backwards by the strength of these thoughts. Seeing Job fortified in this way, the enemy withdrew from him. But finding Judas unguarded, the enemy took him captive. Therefore, if we want to look down on the enemy, we must always think about the things of the Lord. Our souls must always rejoice in hope. Then we will see that the devil's snares are like smoke and the evil ones will flee rather than pursue us." — Athanasius
