LECTIONARY for the ninth Sunday after Pentecost, Year B (2021):

2 Samuel7:1-14a Psalm 89:20-37 Jeremiah 23:1-6 Psalm 23 Ephesians 2:11-22 Mark 6:30-34, 53-56

This ninth Sunday after Pentecost continues this longest season of the liturgical year, during which the Church observes an extended time of study and reflection on the ways in which we, Christ's body here on earth, walk and live in all aspects of our lives under the guidance and power of the Holy Spirit. We use the term "ordinary time" (or Proper time) to identify this season not because it is less important or meaningful than other seasons (such as Eastertide or Advent), but to mark the contrast with the more specifically focused seasons, and because we count these weeks in an ordinal way.

Last week, our attention was drawn to our worship of God—the character, content and modes of our worship, both individually and in community, especially in the context of David's exuberant worship-leading before the Ark of the Lord. This week's readings direct our focus to the Church as seen in several facets: who we are, how we grow, what we become, and Who directs this. We are individually members of Christ's body, which is the Church. In community, we have been brought together in peace and unity by the reconciling work of Christ, so that we are citizens with the saints of all the ages and members of the household of God. We are being built corporately into a holy temple in the Lord, upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets with Christ Himself as the cornerstone, and we are being built together spiritually into "a dwelling place for God" (Eph. 2). As the Church, the embodiment of Christ in the world, we have a mission and responsibilities He has given us to fulfill in the world (Mark 6). We are reminded that God expects those who

Words: Charles Wesley, 1739; Music: Charles Collignon (1725-1785) Public domain. pastor, teach and care for the church do so in the same way, and with the same selfless devotion and energy, that the LORD shepherds His flock (Jeremiah and Psalm 23). And finally, in the Old Testament narrative, we read of David's great desire to build a house—a temple—for the LORD. God refused him, but graciously promised David that He would establish David's house forever, and that through David's son, God would establish the throne of his kingdom and that son would build a house for God's name (2 Samuel). Near the end of his life, David retold this story and revealed why God had refused his desire ("because you are a man of war and have shed blood," 1 Chron. 28:3). But in the last two chapters of 1 Chronicles (which are not in the lectionary but are so very relevant), we read of the importance God placed on the preparation and building of the physical, sacred space in which His people worshiped, and of the joyful, exuberant manner in which His people brought the offerings of their time, talent and treasure.

Profession of Faith

Remember that you were at one time separate from Christ, aliens from the commonwealth of Israel and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world.

But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ.

For He Himself is our peace.

In His flesh He has made the two groups into one, and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us:
He has abolished the law with its commandments and ordinances, so that He might create in Himself one new humanity in place of the two, thus making peace; and so that He might reconcile both to God in one body through the cross, thus putting to death that hostility.

He came and preached peace to you who were far off, and peace to those who were near.

For through Him we both have access in one Spirit to the Father.

So then, we are no longer strangers and aliens, but fellow citizens with the saints and also members of God's household, built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Himself the cornerstone.

In Him the whole structure is fitted and joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord.

In Him we also are being built together into a dwelling place of God in the Spirit.

The antiphonal Profession of Faith is taken from today's Epistle lection.

The first part of the prayer of confession and repentance is adapted from a portion of a prayer by John Henry Newman, a 19th-century British Catholic theologian associated with the Oxford Movement. (Phrases from the Ephesians passage are added.) The second, corporately-read part of the prayer is found in the Book of Common Prayer ("A Prayer of Self-Dedication").

This setting of the traditional Agnus Dei wording is chosen because its ending, "Grant us peace," echoes the Epistle text.

A thought about worship from the Ancient Fathers –

"We pray-that words may be given to us, as it is written in the book of Jeremiah, 'The Lord said to the prophet: "Behold, I have put My words in thy mouth as fire. See, I have set thee this day over the nations, and over the kingdoms, to root out and to pull down, and to destroy, and to throw down, and to build and to plant."" For we need words now that will root out of every wounded soul the disgraces spoken against the truth. . . . We also need thoughts that will pull down all edifices based on false opinions. . . . And we require a wisdom that will throw down all high things that rise against the knowledge of God. Just as we must not stop rooting out and pulling down the hindrances that have just been mentioned, we must, in place of what has been rooted out, plant the plants of God's field. In place of what has been pulled down, we must raise the building of God and the temple of His glory. For that reason, we must also pray to the Lord who gave the gifts named in the book of Jeremiah. Pray that He may grant us words for building up the temple of Christ, for planting the spiritual law, and for teaching others to do the same."
